Avoid Negative Communication



bracing

- "Its just a phase"
- "This can wait until you're out of high school"
- "You don't look gay/trans/nonbinary/other"
- "You are too young to know"
- Don't blame a friend/family member
- Don't encourage a cure/conversion therapy
- Don't use religion as a defense

Continue to do the work

- Become an ally
- Keep an eye out for bullying
- Seek out teen LGTBQIA+ groups
- Does their school have a GSA or LGBTQIA+ Club?
- Vote for LGBTQIA+ supporting candidates
- Research terminology



When a child comes out to a parent, some parents feel denial, sadness, grief, confusion, and others may feel elated, happy, or neutral.

No matter how we feel, it is important to respond with care.

- "Thank you so much for sharing!"
- "You are loved, no matter what"
- "That's important to know about you! I appreciate you letting me know."
- Encourage communication
- Let them know they are cared for
- Listen
